




The Red Circle gathered at Washington's Folger Shakespeare Library on September 8 to celebrate the arrival of the manuscript of *The Valley of Fear* in Washington, which seems quite appropriate, since Washington is mentioned in the story. The afternoon began in the Founders Room with the Folger's interim director Greg Prickman describing Stuart and



Mimi Rose's magnificent collection of important books, and what was involved in selecting 52 of the books for the exhibition at the Folger. We then adjourned to the Exhibition Hall to hear Greg and Peter Blau discuss the manuscript of *The Valley of Fear*, and see the other wonders on display.

The Red Circle returned to the Folger Shakespeare Library on September 12 to join members of the Folger in welcoming Nicholas Meyer to Washington. He was in the midst of his tour of the United States promoting his new novel *Sherlock Holmes and the Telegram from Hell*, which included events in Washington. The evening began in the Stuart and Mimi Rose Exhibition Hall with Greg Prickman presiding over a discussion of Sherlock Holmes and the manuscript of *The Valley of Fear* with Nick and Dan Stashower, and continued in the magnificent Reading Room with Nick reading from his book. He was then interviewed by Dan Stashower, and answered questions from the audience, which was about half members of the Red Circle and half members of the Folger. Our website postcards were available for those who wanted to know more about us.
